Important State and Timeline Updates



Phases



Planning Phase

March 2023 - Sept 2024

Regional Economic Development Plans - establishing regional governance structure; conducting research; community outreach and engagement



Catalyst Phase

Regional RFP to be Released in October 2024

\$9M for pre-project development; \$3.5M for Collaborative operations and compliance/grant administration; \$1.5M for sector investment coordinators

**Unaffected by May Revise*



Implementation Phase

Draft SFP Open for Public Comment July 2 - July 22/23

Applications for Funding Open September 10, due November 1

Ready-to-launch projects that align with Regional Economic Development Plans.

**Proposed \$50M annual reduction under the May Revise*



Tribal Funding Opportunity

\$25 million statewide to invest in tribal-led planning and implementation projects, which must be completed by September 2026.







Inclusionary Pathway Strategies

Racial Equity:
Prioritize connecting BIPOC to high-quality jobs

- Latinex population needs more representation & equitable wages
- Career pathways for previously foster or Incarcerated
- Green For All & Pride Industries
- Focus on CTE trainings + internships for youth

Local Serving: Ag education and training, land for community co-ops

- Be wary of taking jobs from ag workers and giving to ag tech
- Women’s Earth Alliance, regenerative agriculture and health accelerator
- Provide housing, health care, transport, translation services, ESL

Supporting small business + minority entrepreneurs

- 1.9M minority small businesses in CA employing 2.5M

Healthcare and Wellness

Our region has major medical systems such as Barton Health, Tahoe Forest and UC Davis Health, providing many high-quality jobs. Utilizing these in coordination with our natural landscape is key to our future development.



Hospitality and Tourism

In our region, this sector employs a large number of workers, particularly in and around the Tahoe Basin. It also involves businesses of all sizes, from microbusinesses to major resorts servicing up to 15 million annual visitors.



Environmental Innovation

In the recently completed Prosperity Playbook we have similar findings to what has been identified in our regional cluster analysis. Innovation in Advanced Businesses, Including Manufacturing will play a key in successful initiatives.



“Working” Lands

The beautiful geography of Lake Tahoe also incorporates a set of challenges in not only keeping our communities resistant to natural disasters but also in procuring quality food at affordable prices.

Tahoe has some of the most expensive food prices in the county.



Inclusionary Pathway Strategies

Childcare

Support and align projects with Childcare initiatives and cooperatives to ensure inclusion of or targeted community members. Coordinate Regionally to enhance efforts .

Housing

Prioritize initiatives and organizations that incorporate lodging or housing within their scopes ensuring community accessibility.

Food

Accessibility to quality food is a major concern to our local workforce where geographical issues not only raise the cost of food but also the opportunity to purchase.

'Good Jobs' in tradeable sectors

Align regional research with our identified Prosperity Playbook economic opportunities.

In Summary

Resiliency

Resources previously designed to provide upward mobility to individuals and families in our region are often left unutilized by those who would benefit the most from them.

Recent changes in our economy have made it increasingly difficult to 'Live Where You Work' in places like Lake Tahoe and Nevada Counties.

Accessibility

Longer commutes and working hours are now a necessity in our region to make a living wage. The increase in the amount of time these activities require leaves our rural community members increasingly unable to participate in initiatives designed to create more well paying jobs for those previously underserved.

Prosperity

Our future initiatives designed to create more 'well paying jobs' will need to incorporate aspects that assist our community members in the tasks they currently spend the most daily time on:

Inclusionary Pathway Strategies

Raising the Minimum Wage

Increasing the minimum wage based on the rising cost of living, making sure that workers can afford basic necessities and reduce the stress of financial instability.

Equitable Worker Rights Education

Deploy educational initiatives aimed at educating workers about their entitlements, wage regulations, workplace safety, and benefits. This enables workers to know their rights and understand their entitled privileges.

Labor Contractor Regulation

Regulating labor contractors would empower workers to negotiate higher wages directly with employers, fostering stability in seasonal employment. Financial safeguards could mitigate income fluctuations during off-seasons or economic shocks.

Inclusionary Pathway Strategies

In-House Local Leadership and Training Programs:

Training and leadership development initiatives should focus on workplace dynamics to cultivate a perception of opportunity among workers for obtaining high-quality employment within their current roles, eliminating the necessity to search for advancement elsewhere.

Education & Skill Development

Address qualification gaps through employer benefits and resources to support on the job training and skills building, and interpretation needs. Support educational institutions such as Yuba College and trade programs in areas that meet both the interest of the community, and the needs of growing/opportunity industries. Additionally, offer opportunities to bridge international degrees and qualifications.

YUBA/SUTTER SUBREGION

Potential Industry-Aligned Projects

Forest Biomass Business Center Project

The Camptonville Community Partnership (CCP) is spearheading the creation of a small forest biomass to energy facility in the Yuba County foothills, representing a holistic vision of sustainable development and community empowerment. This community-driven, grassroots initiative promotes economic resilience but also mitigates fire risk, promotes forest health, and catalyzes regional prosperity.

Yuba Sutter Transit Facility

A regional project in Yuba County aims to replace an outdated facility to accommodate the infrastructure needed for the transition to zero-emission buses by 2028, enhancing connectivity for disadvantaged communities to the capital region. Supports local economic development by creating high-quality construction and transportation jobs and facilitating increased ridership and coverage for Yuba Sutter Transit.

South Yuba County Regional Water/Wastewater

This South Yuba County project aims to improve water and wastewater infrastructure in the region, specifically targeting disadvantaged communities like Wheatland and Olivehurst, by connecting them to a centralized municipal system. This initiative enhances access to reliable services and protects the environment and supports economic development, including commercial development on Estom Yumeka Maidu Tribe property. The project represents a significant step towards addressing infrastructure disparities, promoting sustainable development, and fostering economic opportunities for future prosperity in the region.

Greater Sacramento Education and Economic Commission (GSEEC) Advancement Initiative

GSEEC comprises partners from education, government, and business sectors, aiming to design and implement an equity-based ecosystem to support regional success. Through the creation of an Education and Economic Center (EEC), GSEEC will provide comprehensive support for high-priority learners, bridging education and workforce needs through collaboration with K-16 institutions, adult education, local employers, and government agencies, ultimately serving as a prototype for similar communities.

\$2M Capital Region Collaborative Operations

\$1.5M Compliance & Grant Administration

- **Outreach and engagement** activities, to ensure inclusion of disinvested communities.
- Continuously updating **research** to keep plans current for future funding opportunities.
- **Supporting the Implementation Phase** application process.
- Supporting projects in obtaining **additional sources of funding** (private, federal, etc.).



Catalyst Fund

\$1.5M Sector Investment Coordinators

- Support the **implementation of cluster strategies** by coordinating projects and supporting the development of systems to support success.
- Find and apply for state, federal, and private **grants**.
- **Liaise** with **workforce and economic development partners**, community-based organizations.



Catalyst Fund

\$9M Project Pre-Development

- Feasibility studies; market analysis; environmental assessments, surveys, and remediation; site acquisition; site and development plans.
- Establishing an equity framework to advance inclusionary strategies.
- Securing long-term funding opportunities.
- Local workforce and staff development.


